MONDAY 4 AND TUESDAY 5 NOVEMBER EXCURSION TO LAIKIPIA ORGANISED BY LAURENCE FRANK

MORE information is available from the ALWG website: http://www.africanliongroup.org/meetings.htmlThe excursions will consist of visits to Laikipia ranches and conservancies to learn how they raise livestock commercially in rangelands that also support robust populations of all the African large carnivores and their wild prey. We will see the locally developed mobile lion-proof bomas, local herding practices, the use of GPS collars to aid in lion and livestock management, and the new Lion Rangers progamme. Steven Ekwanga will demonstrate the setting of foot snares, a technique that is more efficient and humane than cage traps for capturing wary lions that cannot be approached for free darting. We will not actually trap any carnivores.
